

I would like to share with you an article I found most appropriate for the April Trestleboard. It was written by Right Worshipful brother Christopher J. Busby, Grand lecturer Of the Grand Lodge of New Hampshire are free and accepted Masons.

"What is the purpose and power of Masonic ritual?"



Our ritual is the heart and soul of the fraternity. All our tenants, philosophies, and myths reside there. Without it, we would simply be another social or charitable club. Our ritual sets us apart. It Binds us with each other and with every Mason throughout time. Masonic ritual is not simply made-up of words. Indeed, any individual with access with the Internet can obtain a wealth of information without the forms and ceremonies of the craft.

Does one that simply reads and memorizes the ritual become a Mason. Of course, the answer is "no". Without the right men to join us, and without the right experience to act as a catalyst for transformation, the words are merely ideas. One may look upon our ritual as mediation. The opening and closing of the lodge, the floor work. Of a degree, our charges are inculcated to center us to our labors. To teachers as well as to remind. To unite us around a guiding set of principles and awaken our spirits.






## 🖈 Grand Master of California Masons 🖈

# Klein's Korner - Book Keview


review of "FREEMASONRY, Symbols, Secrets, Significance" written by W. Kirk MacNulty

T W. Kirk MacNulty (1932-2020), the author of this and several other fine works, was a prominent Mason and author on both sides

of the Atlantic. The book begins by delving

into the early origins of the Craft in exquisite detail, from the legendary origins of King Solomon's Temple, through the Knights Templars, then the Stone Masons of the Middle Ages and finally into the Renaissance.

In the formation of Operative Freemason-ry, MacNulty advocates that the influence of the Renaissance has been understated in the development of Freemasonry. It is his belief that Freemasonry is the codification of the Hermetic/Cabbalistic tradition that was the essence of the Renaissance. He adds that the Renaissance saw a "significant increase in the status of the architect, who should be knowledgeable in the subjects of philosophy, arithmetic, geometry, history, music,



medicine, jurisprudence and astronomy... which were embraced by the Liberal Arts and Sciences and the basic education of the time." He adds that it is reasonable to believe that early Freemasons' interest in the Renaissance was incorporated into Masonry. MacNulty has a point - the Renaissance is overlooked as an influence on Freemasonry. The ideals of freedom and democracy were also forming in this era and the Enlightenment which soon followed. It is the opinion of this reviewer that the embrace of these ideals helped transition the Craft from being Operative Masons to Speculative Masons. Additionally, without these ideals, Freemasonry as we know it today may not have come into existence.

Next, MacNulty takes us into the early years of Operative Masonry, which was often viewed as


a threat to the government, and/or to the Church. The democratic and ecumenical nature of the lodge structure was historically unprecedented. Despite these obstacles, Masonry expanded enormously in a relatively short time. In about 30 years it existed in much of the world, spread largely by the expanding British empire. Although very egalitarian in nature, Freemasonry would never have taken root and spread as it did without the enthusiastic embrace of intellectual men, influential men of wealth and high social standing.

This book is richly illustrated with 386 illustrations, 327 in color. Included are historic aprons, jewels, furniture, charters, patents, tapestries, ceramics, paintings, working tools, photographs, etchings, photos of buildings, lodge rooms and more. This collection that MacNulty assembles in this book is breathtaking. The history of the early days of the Craft is shown in

these illustrations, MacNulty believes modern Masons have been giving too much of their attention to charities and social activities and have not been focusing on the core philosophical teachings of the Order. He continues that the present period is a good opportunity for Masons because young people in Western societies are showing an increasing interest in metaphysics which is comparable to the Hermetic/Cabbalistic traditions.

Adoptive Masonry, or women's masonry, more common in Europe and England than the United States is discussed, as is the anti-Masonic political movement in the USA and other countries. Modern Masonic history is not the subject of this book and only appears in passing toward the end of the book. MacNulty was clearly writing of the origins of the Craft in this book. He also doesn't include youth orders and very little on appendant bodies, His focus was clearly on the formation of the Blue Lodge. He briefly touches upon Masons in science, exploration, fine arts, leaders and royals - mostly from a British perspective.

MacNulty provides the addresses of every Grand Lodge in foreign countries, alphabetical by



country (some nations have multiple Grand Lodges) international Masonic bodies, Masonic museums and libraries, plus even websites, magazines and journals. (The United States is not mentioned because the USA does not have a national Grand Lodge.)


This is an essential book for any brother who seeks more Light in Masonry, who is starting or expanding a good Masonic library. This is one of the great books that should be on his bookshelf.




